Highlights



- Sales Sourcing Regulations Shift the way we calculate a business's gross receipts to be predominantly based on sales in San Francisco.
- Advance Written Determinations (AWD) A program that allows taxpayers to obtain advance determinations regarding their tax liability or other tax issues.
- Voluntary Disclosure Agreement (VDA) A program to waive certain taxes, penalties, and/or interest when taxpayers voluntarily disclose and pay unpaid back taxes and interest for the previous six years in exchange for a waiver.
- Small Business License Reform Waive approximately \$10 million in regulatory license fees currently paid by small businesses.
 - 91% of restaurants and 87% of businesses in San Francisco's nightlife will have their annual bill fully eliminated.



Highlights



- **Financial Counseling Relaunch** A free program that offers one-on-one financial counseling to anyone who lives, works, or receives services in the city.
- **Boosting College Enrollment** New research shows that K2C significantly boosts college enrollment and on-time high school graduation, particularly for underreported students.
- **SF Lends** An initiative that aims to connect small businesses and affordable loans and lines of credit for their day-to-day cashflow needs.
- **AFTER Program** Published a new report on the impact of the AFTER Program (Aims to Foster Transformation & Ensure Restitution), one of the first efforts in the country to pilot an alternative to our broken system of juvenile restitution.



Priorities for the Future



- Convened three listening sessions to learn about consumer, small business, and government banking needs. Community input will inform plans of the city's contracted banks.
- Complete implementation of business tax simplification and reform measures.
- Celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Office of Financial Empowerment.
- Continue using AI to accelerate work processes.

- Increase Department Revenue by \$878K in FY26 and \$1.1M in FY27
- Further position reduction Eliminate 6 FTEs (vacant positions)
